Students from both 7th grade teams participated in a large group guidance lesson on exploring future careers earlier in the quarter. From that lesson, Career Café was formed. Career Café consists of small groups of students who share a common

interest in a particular career. The students and the school counselors meet during lunch in the cafeteria to discuss and explore careers in depth. During Career Café, students learn about career concepts such as job responsibilities, salary, level of education, job outlook, and related careers. Students are also given a list of postsecondary institutions where they can further their education after high school gradua-

tion and specific courses offered at Fuquay-Varina High School that will prepare them for their future career. Most importantly, students find the relevance and connection between their middle school education and a future career choice.
